NEW CELL PHONE POLICY

As we all know, one of the biggest changes we saw this year was the updated cell phone policy. Although the new phone policy feels like it has made a substantial difference for everyday life at Shawsheen Tech, it is not hugely different when compared to the old policy. That may seem impossible, but the real difference is not allowing cell phones to be seen or used in the hallways and having a more severe consequence. Previously cell phone in the classroom was determined by teacher discretion, so in some classes you could use them for educational purposes and in others you were not allowed.

Members of the Rampage staff interviewed 525 students over a few days during homeroom to find out what students really thought about the new policy. Opinions varied, and students had a range of reasons for why they either liked or disliked the policy. Let us look at how students react to the new phone policy.

First let us look at the positive reactions toward the policy. Of the 525 students interviewed, only a mere 16 students said they fully supported the policy, only 3% of students polled. Some of the reasons they support the policy is because it felt "freeing" to put their phone away. These students enjoyed the break from social media, and they did not need to worry about the constant notifications coming through their phones. It helped to eliminate distraction during the day. Though the students that supported the policy were

among the smallest group of students, they gave their opinion in a well-spoken and thoughtful manner.

Next let us look at the students who are "in the middle" or "undecided." 79 students, or 15% of students polled, pointed out both the good and bad aspects of the cell phone policy. These students liked some parts of the policy, but not others. They were able to explain, in detail, how they felt about the policy at hand. Although these students agreed that the new policy was "freeing," they did not like the harsh punishment that followed. This group felt strongly against having to face detention, if caught using their phone, especially if they were using their phones for school related tasks, or simply listening to music.

Finally, let us look at the number of students who do not like the phone policy. 82% percent, 430 out of 525 of students interviewed, had strong negative opinions regarding the phone policy. These students were very willing to share their opinions. Most students said they wanted to be able to listen to



music, take pictures of their work, and even one student said they would like to be able to keep track of a medical condition. These students were the most receptive to answers when prompted. We realized through interviews that some students may not be aware that exceptions for medical conditions are allowed. Students who think they qualify for an exemption should reach out to the Dean's office.

On top of asking students for their opinions, we asked the Dean's office for the average number of detentions given per week due to cell phone violations. On average, there were about 10-20 detentions per week. The first week of school, however, had between 25-30 detentions, almost 10 more than the weeks following.

Now that we have looked at all that, what does it all mean? Well, this information means that many of the students interviewed disliked the new phone policy. A large majority think it is unfair for the students to be punished for cell phone use. The phone policy change might not be that different than the old one in practice, but to the students this year, it feels a lot worse than it might seem. If you have questions regarding the cell phone policy and the specifics in it, we encourage you to ask your teachers or the administration about it, especially if one of the reasons you need your phone is for a medical condition. In the next issue of the Rampage, we will continue this topic and ask for staff opinions regarding this policy change.
