### WHAT SHOULD FRESHMEN KNOW **ABOUT THE SHOP?**

Cosmetology is a licensed trade. Our students have to complete 1000 hours of schooling. Then they have to pass a practical and written test to become licensed. We focus on hair, skin and nails. There is a lot of science in our profession.

#### WHAT DOES YOUR SHOP FOCUS ON?

Our students learn about bacteriology, the diseases and disorders of the hair, skin and nails, anatomy, chemistry and electricity are a few of the things we focus on. Also, our students need to learn about customer service as we work on clients in the shop.

#### WHAT DO SENIORS GRADUATE WITH?

The seniors can graduate with their cosmetology license!

#### WHAT SHOULD FRESHMEN KNOW **ABOUT THE SHOP?**

In Drafting we create technical drawings for the manufacturing or architectural fields. The drafting field opens up career opportunities in lots of different areas of Architectural Design, Mechanical Design and Electro-Mechanical Design.

#### WHAT DOES YOUR SHOP FOCUS ON?

During the exploratory week we focus on a quick introduction to the field. We concentrate on using 2D AutoCAD during exploratory as well as some design challenges. If a student chooses Drafting then in the following years we will dive deeper into all aspects to prepare you for an engineering or architectural tract in college or a job in the architectural, mechanical or electromechanical design engineering fields.

#### WHAT DO SENIORS GRADUATE WITH?

Seniors leave the Drafting shop fully prepared to land a job in one of the engineering or design fields in architecture, mechanical or electromechanical as well as fully prepared to enter college level courses in your desired field!

#### WHAT SHOULD FRESHMEN KNOW **ABOUT THE SHOP?**

Freshmen should know that the Plumbing trade is a Licensed trade, and that the preparation for the journeyman's examination is no joke. Apprenticeship training in plumbing takes dedication and discipline. It is kind of like a college education with 550 hours of related code and theory, and 6800 hours of in the field training before eligibility to sit for the exam. That being said, when students come in to explore our shop, we want them to have fun, learn something they didn't know before, and be able to make a decision with the facts presented if this is the right fit for them.

### WHAT DOES YOUR SHOP FOCUS ON?

Our main focus other than teaching the trade, is preparing the students to enter the real world. Work ethic is one of the most important things we instill in our students.

#### WHAT DO SENIORS GRADUATE WITH?

Our Seniors graduate with 330 Hours of code and theory, an OSHA 10 card, 1700 hours of hands-on field training, and a number of product training certificates. And most importantly for most students, a great start to a career.

### WHAT SHOULD FRESHMEN KNOW **ABOUT THE SHOP?**

We review safety and do a lot of fun hands-on skills like, pour up and label a set of teeth in plaster, take and pour up an Alginate impression, make a mouthguard with the vacuum former, place a dental sealant on a study model, learn about the importance of oral health, and why brushing and flossing can prevent overall health issues.

#### WHAT DOES YOUR SHOP FOCUS ON?

The most important things are safety and keeping on task. Sophomore year the main focus is infection control and Junior year is radiology to prepare to take the DANB exams.

#### WHAT DO SENIORS GRADUATE WITH?

The students graduate with CPR, first aid and career safe certifications. The students are prepared to take the DANB, ICE + RHS exams. They may register as a dental assistant for Massachusetts Dental Assisting Licensure through DPH+ Board of Registration in Dentistry (BORID).

### MENTAL HEALTH

According to Education Secretary Miguel Cardona -Before the pandemic it estimated that 13-22% of school age children experienced some kind of mental health challenge. Now researchers estimate that number is up to 80%. Life has never been easy, but these last few years especially have caused a lot of stress on everyone. Being stuck inside with very little human contact really had an impact on people. For a lot of students, school is where they connect with teachers, counselors, and friends who can identify warning signs of mental health problems and/or problems at home. School can be used as an escape from issues at home as well. When school was on-line during the pandemic, it limited the resources available to students. Many students get their joy from friends and being separated for so long added to their feelings of loneliness. Thankfully we are back in school but that can cause anxiety for some as well. There are students who have been diagnosed with anxiety and depression, who have reached out for help, but there are still many who suffer, that may not come forward with their issues. For the ones who do come forward, gaining access

to resources can be tricky. Finding an outside therapist is very difficult, with some wait lists up to 10 months, or therapists who are only scheduling on-line appointments which don't work for every student. In extreme cases which include concerns about their safety, some kids need to wait to get treatment or placement in a mental health program for up to 10 days. All of this information can feel overwhelming, and if you are having a difficult time, you may ask yourself, "Where do I get help?"

Luckily, there are many in-house resources here at Shawsheen Tech that are available to all students. Students have access to their assigned guidance counselors who offer a variety of helpful resources. Whether it is college and career planning, worries about grades or concerns in shop or academics, or a safe place to talk about other problems going on, there are many people available to offer a helping hand to students. The individuals in this office can offer you support to help you with a variety of issues.

In addition to guidance counselors, there are 3 School Adjustment Counselors and 2 School Psychologists who provide added counseling support for students. Lastly, the staff at Shawsheen Tech is learning about relationship mapping which is a way for teachers and staff members to get to know each student on a more personal level. If teachers are aware of issues that students have going on, they can offer support to help the student.

In closing, if you are struggling with any issues this year, please don't feel like it is "only you" or that you are alone. The staff are here to support you.









